- H. ABRAHAM, 147, High Street, Southampton.
A collection of Hampshire lepidoptera.
- REV. H. G. W. AUBREY, Hale Rectory.
A collection of the less common local birds, local lepidoptera and diptera.
Microscopical preparations of insects, anatomical and otherwise.
- HERBERT ASHBY, Pinehurst, Basset, Southampton.
A collection of British birds' eggs and British lepidoptera.
- A. J. JUKES-BROWN, F.G.S., The Hazels, Oxford Road, Shirley, Southampton.
A collection of English cretaceous fossils, and some others.
- FRANCIS BUCKELL, M.R.C.S., Palmerston Street, Romsey.
A collection of British lepidoptera and a botanical herbarium.
- P. M. BRIGHT, Roccabruna, Bournemouth.
An entomological collection, chiefly lepidoptera, including nearly all the New Forest species.
- GEO. B. CORBIN, Ringwood.
A collection of British birds and their eggs, also of local lepidoptera, especially a fine series of those found in the New Forest moorlands.
- REV. CANON COMPTON, Minstead.
A collection of fossils from the Upper and Middle Eocene Tertiaries of the Hampshire beds, especially from the Bracklesham beds.
- G. W. COLENUTT, 58, High Street, Cowes.
A collection (at Ryde) of cretaceous and tertiary fossils of the Isle of Wight, especially from the Upper Eocene and Hempstead beds. Also fossils from older rocks and some minerals.
- C. H. O. CURTIS, 2, Oxford Villas, Oxford Road, Bournemouth.
A collection of fossils from the Barton clay, about 200 species, some rare.
Paleolithic flint implements from Barton Cliff. Neolithic flint implements from the neighbourhood of Bournemouth.
- W. E. DARWIN, Ridgmount, Basset, Southampton.
A collection of paleolithic flint implements from the river gravels of Southampton Common.
- W. DALE, F.G.S., 5, Sussex Place, Southampton.
A collection of fossils from the crags of Suffolk, from London tertiaries, and from the upper and lower chalk of Surrey.
Worked flints of neolithic age from Surrey, and paleolithic flint implements from Southampton Common.
British coins, silver and copper. British insects.
Early keyboard instruments of English make, preceding the Pianoforte, of the 17th and 18th centuries.
- J. W. ELWES, Otterbourne, Winchester.
A very complete collection of fossils from the Hampshire tertiaries.

- H. PUREFOY FITZGERALD, Preston Candover, Basingstoke.
A good collection of land and freshwater shells of North Hants, especially from the Candover Valley, also a complete herbarium illustrative of the Flora of the same valley.
- REV. A. C. HERVEY, Hartley Maudit Rectory, Alton, Hants.
A large and very complete collection of Hampshire lepidoptera and other insects.
- HON. AUBERON HERBERT, Old House, Ringwood.
A small collection of paleolithic implements from Barton, Hordle, fossils from the Hempstead and Hordle beds.
A few bronze and stone implements from foreign countries.
- H. B. LANKESTER, 136, High Street, Southampton.
A collection of birds' eggs and butterflies, chiefly Hampshire.
Derived fossils from the Essex drift, &c., &c.
- ORDNANCE SURVEY OFFICE, Southampton.
A collection of fossils and minerals, chiefly from Palestine.
Paleolithic flint implements from Southampton.
Models of Stonehenge, Jerusalem, and Mount Sinai.
- R. G. PINDER, Hernhurst, Bournemouth.
A collection of fossils from the Barton clay.
- T. B. RAKE, M.R.C.S., Fordingbridge.
A very complete collection of the eggs of British birds, British lepidoptera and coleoptera.
British shells, marine, land, and freshwater.
- S. JAMES A. SALTER, F.R.S., Basingfield, Basingstoke.
A collection of English and Irish marbles (Derbyshire, Devonshire, Dorset, Somerset, Connemara, and Kilkenny) in the form of copies of antique vases, &c.
A miscellaneous arboretum, especially rich in the genus *Acer*.
A "salictum" or willow garden, containing about 130 species or forms; nearly every British *Salix*, many from Central Europe, several from America, and a few from Asia.
- A. H. SKELTON, Portland Villa, St. Denys Road, Southampton.
A collection of ancient British, Roman, and English coins.
- REV. J. VAUGHAN, M.A., Alton, Hants.
A herbarium of local plants.
- MRS. VAUDREY, Langley Manor, Eling.
A collection of lavas from the Sandwich and other Islands, from S. America, Europe, &c. Also some minerals.
- E. WESTLAKE, F.G.S., Fordingbridge.
A collection of fossils principally from the chalk and Hampshire basin of the London clay. British rocks and minerals. Local paleolithic implements. A general collection of marine shells. Local hymenoptera, lepidoptera, and coleoptera.
Local ferns.
- W. WHITAKER, F.R.S., F.G.S., 33, East Park Terrace, Southampton.
A collection of rocks and minerals, chiefly from the London basin.
Land and freshwater shells, especially varieties of *helix nemoralis*.
A few worked flints - neolithic and paleolithic.
- WINCHESTER COLLEGE.
A variety of antique objects, armour, furniture, &c., connected with the history of the College.

A collection of fossils from the Barton beds, and a very good collection from the Calcaire Grossier beds of Grignon, near Paris.
